Redfield Clinic News

Insomnia aides: Actions that can help manage insomnia include:

- Arising at the same time every day.
- Avoiding stimulants especially caffeine.
- Turning off electronics like cell phones and digital lighted clocks.
- Wearing a sleep mask to block light from your eyes.
- Avoiding stimulating actions around bedtime such as exercise and hot baths.
- Sleeping in a dark, quiet and cool environment and getting up if you can't sleep to do relaxing things like listening to a bedtime story or a recording of raindrops on the roof.

Loud snoring, restless sleep and falling asleep while driving are serious symptoms that need further evaluation. Shakespeare said "sleep, sweet sleep perhaps to dream. Ah there is the rub". Nothing improves one's outlook, efficiency and attitude better than a good night's sleep.

Annual physicals: School begins in August. Most school children should have an annual physical. These can be obtained at the Redfield Clinic (833-2301). Medicaid plans require an annual physical or paying a monthly premium.

Free athletic physicals: The Redfield clinic continues to offer sports physicals at no charge to West Central Valley students or clinic patients who are students. The Redfield Clinic will continue to support WCV athletic programs financially.

Rules delayed: Unneeded and costly medical rules were tabled by the PA regulatory Board at their July meeting.

Redfield City Council

July 5th, 2016

The Redfield City Council met in regular session Tuesday, July 5, 2016. Mayor Lantz called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Present were council members Danielson, DeZeeuw, and Bowman, Attorney Stewart and Clerk Light. Godwin-Pote arrived at 7:10 p.m. and Hoy at 7:45 p.m.

Bowman moved to approve the agenda with no additions, Danielson seconded. Roll call vote – all ayes.

A motion was made by Bowman and seconded by DeZeeuw to approve the consent agenda which includes the minutes of the last meeting, claims paid, and the library report. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Tim Flanigan was introduced as the new Zoning Administrator. He asked the Council how to change a property address to accurately reflect the street upon which a home is located. City Attorney will research the issue.

Reports were not received from the EMS or the Fire Department. Danielson asked that a letter be sent to both departments asking them for a report.

Deputy Sanchez reported 3,100 minutes of patrol time for the month with 11 calls and three arrests. Sanchez said he will patrol more in the evenings as he has seen increased activity. Discussion was held regarding towing of abandoned and junk vehicles.

Rob Lemon visited with the council about his plans to remodel the home at 517 Third Street. Lemon said he paid up the delinquent real estate taxes and plans to reconstruct the bottom story of the home but needs time to get that done. He asked for a 90-day extension. Lemon is waiting on the deed to be signed and recorded. Attorney explained to him and the Council that if the deed is signed, the City will have to start over with the abatement process.

Public Works Director Danielson reported the street work has been done and there is still about \$70,000 in the LOST fund for streets. Danielson would like to have some more done this fall if possible. He would like to see Redfield and Taylor Streets be done. DeZeeuw moved and Godwin-Pote seconded approval. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Jetco should be here the end of July to take the water tower off line August 1st to be cleaned. Danielson spoke with the DNR regarding a mixer for the tank, great idea but will check with other towns first. The sidewalk projects are still on and should be started anytime.

Godwin-Pote and Mayor Lantz thanked the city employees for all the hard work getting ready for the Bacon Ride and Old Settler's, and cleaning up after.

Justin Barnett visited with the council regarding cleanup of his property. He has four to five drivers and all vehicles are licensed and running but hard to fit them all in the drive. Barnett said until reading the City code, he did not realize residents could not park on the parking. He has the race cars moved out of town and will do his best to keep the cars in the drive. Bowman said he has had complaints from Thomas Street residents regarding cars parked near the corner and how hard it is to see around the corner. Mayor Lantz thanked him for coming to the meeting and cleaning up the property.

Nuisance properties were discussed. DeZeeuw proposed the City have a compliance officer to take pictures and list what property owners need to clean up or fix up. This would shorten the council meetings immensely as we go over the same properties month-to-month. She asked that the council and Mayor think it over to see if something like that would work.

The cost of the asbestos inspection, \$407.75, recently done at 517 Third Street will be assessed to the property and we will move forward with the abatement. The cost of the asbestos inspection at 1206 First Street was \$408.75, it will be assessed as well. Abandoned car out front of 1405 Thomas Street will be towed and impounded by Sheriff. Two more cars on that property are blocking the City right of way. Abandoned cars will be towed and impounded. Junk cars will need to be removed or abated as a nuisance. Cleanup of the property will begin and cost will be assessed to the property owner. The Clerk will send a letter to the property owner of 702 Clark regarding mowing the property every other week. If this is not done, the city will mow and the cost will be assessed to the owner. The City will proceed with cleanup of 529 Third Street and assess costs to their property taxes.

EMS rep Teresa Nolan arrived and reported 13 calls for the month of May and nine calls in June, one of those in Linden.

Danielson spoke about the Mobile Food Pantry Program that the Food Bank of Iowa sponsors. City Hall will be visited on Wednesday to see if it could be used once a month, volunteers would be needed to fill boxes to give to anyone needing food.

Employee Evaluations will be completed by the August meeting.

Bowman moved that the meeting adjourn, DeZeeuw seconded. Meeting adjourned.

HomeCare Services, Inc. of Dallas County has been providing community based services in Dallas County since 1967. One of HomeCare's services is nutrition, which includes both home-delivered meals as well as congregate meals.

Congregate meals are meals served in group settings such as community centers, senior housing facilities, and senior centers to people who are at least 60 years of age. Meals are served up to 5 days a week, typically around 11:30AM. The meals are healthy and designed to meet the nutritional needs of adults 60+. Meals are served on a contribution basis, meaning participants pay what they are able (suggested contribution is around \$3/meal).

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
