Redfield Clinic News

Allergies increase: 30% of adults and 40% of kids suffer from allergies. Symptoms may include watery, itchy eyes, nasal congestion, and runny nose, and dry cough and wheezing. Kids who play outdoors while growing up have fewer allergies. Management of allergies includes avoidance of triggers like pollens, using air conditioning, changing clothes when coming in doors after being outside as well as showering, taking antihistamines early on days of high pollen counts and desensitization treatment. That can include allergy shots and, now, allergy drops by mouth to gradually train the immune system not to over react. Dexfield Questers Chapter #604

The Dexfield Questers Chapter #604 wanted to insure the memorial stone that marks the burial site of Col. James Redfield, for whom this town was named in 1860, will be standing for another 100 years. Col. Redfield fought and died in the Civil War at Allatoona Pass in Georgia on October 5th, 1864. His body was returned to Redfield Wiscotta Cemetery for burial, along with bodies of other soldiers from the 39th Regiment.

The chapter reached out to the Redfield Community for assistance with the project and received donations from individuals and organizations. John C. Heider, a professional from Illinois, and Rod Stanley, restored the monument back to its glory by filling the cracks, cleaning and polishing the marble stone. The project was completed in October, 2015. The remaining money will be used to restore other Civil War memorials in the spring of 2016.

Our local project received recognition in The Quester Quarterly 2016 international Spring magazine for this project. The Quester's are a non-profit organization educating through research and study of antiques to donate funds to the preservation and restoration of existing memorials, historical buildings, landmarks and educational purposes.

A Cemetery Restoration and Preservation Workshop will be given by John C. Heider with the help of Rod Stanley on May 21 & 22. For those of you interested in preserving history, this workshop will give you hands on methods of cleaning and repairing old and neglected memorial stones. The cost to learn these valuable methods of restoration is \$60 for one day or \$100 for both days. Preregister by May 14th by calling Rod Stanley 641-757-9173.

Redfield City Council

April 5th, 2016

The Redfield City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, April 5, 2016. Mayor Lantz called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Present were council members Hoy, Bowman, DeZeeuw, and Danielson, Attorney Stewart and Clerk Light. Godwin-Pote was absent.

Bowman moved to approve the agenda with the addition under New Business, Public Hearing for the Budget Amendment on May 3, 2016. Hoy seconded the motion. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Bowman had a question regarding the city's insurance, wondered how it compared to previous premiums. It is higher due to increasing property amounts. Danielson moved to approve the consent agenda, which included the minutes of the previous meeting, claims paid, and the Library report. DeZeeuw seconded the motion. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Jim Eide, Zoning Administrator, reported five permits were issued, three shed permits, one fence and one new home. Four permits are pending. Discussion was held about the tire shop regarding a sewer line running across the parking to First Street. Danielson said Accu-Jet could camera the line and find out the location of the sewer line before allowing construction to continue at the tire shop.

Persons interested in the Zoning position were present. Tim Flannigan, 902 Grant Street, Dave Griffith, 1609 Taylor Street, and Kate Paardekooper, 704 Grant Street, are all interested. Hoy moved that the Housing committee, which is Bowman and DeZeeuw along with Eide, meet and give recommendation to the council on their decision. Danielson seconded. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Fire Chief, Mike Short, reported three calls for the month of March with nine man-hours. Elections took place on Monday at the Fire Department meeting. Fire Chief is Mike Short, Tony Kendall as Assistant Chief, 1st Captain, Wes Bosier, 2nd Captain, Mason Cave, 3rd Captain, Alex Armburg, Safety Officer, Vince Stonehocker, Training Officer, John Jennings, and Rich Byrnes, Secretary.

Kate Paardekooper reported 19 calls for the EMS, all in Redfield.

Deputy Sanchez was on hand to answer questions on the police report. Total calls were 33, with 117.5 hours of patrol time. There were three arrests. Dog issues were again discussed regarding running at large, citations, and tags.

Vince Stonehocker asked the council what is being done with the 529 Third Street property. A letter was sent and the owner has until the 11th to get the property cleaned up. The owner called the City Clerk saying he would move a trailer in and have everything picked up by the end of the day on April 10th. Stonehocker is tired of all the trash blowing onto his property.

Jessica Reznicek and Amber Williams signed in as visitors. Reznicek is concerned about the water treatment plant and thinks we need to dump the DNR. Danielson explained that the DNR regulates the water in Iowa, he checks water daily and reports monthly. Reznicek accused the City of fraud and made other unsubstantiated claims. Because her behavior became disruptive, she was soon asked to leave and escorted out by Deputy Sanchez. Williams proceeded to demand answers from the council, Attorney Stewart said no reply was necessary as this was just a time for public comment. Williams complained about why the minutes are not always in the City newsletter, and are published in the Stuart Herald instead of the Dallas County News. Hoy mentioned the publication date and problems with the Dallas County News in the past. The clerk said the Stuart Herald is the official newspaper for the City of Redfield.

Dode Davis, spokesperson for the Pedal for Prevention, as April is sexual assault awareness month. Davis spoke about the upcoming ride and will be located at the bike trail by the Redfield Depot two half days in April. The council approved and all proceeds will help to fund sexual assault survivors in Dallas County.

Danielson, PW Director, reported on infiltration issues as the groundwater table is high. He thinks possibly water is coming in where the city took down houses with sanitary sewer in place. Danielson would like to run a camera in all four areas at a cost of \$2,500, in hopes we can cut flow to the lagoons by 20%. Hoy moved and Bowman seconded to have Accu-Jet proceed. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Danielson would like to have Jetco change programming and take the tower off line for 30 days while Utility Services clean and paint the tower. The programming will be at a cost of \$6,600, the contract with Utility Services will cover the cost for cleaning and painting of the tower. Bowman moved and Hoy seconded for approval. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Blacktop Services will start on the streets the first of May. Several areas are on the list at a cost of nearly \$80,000. This will be covered with L.O.S.T. funds. Motion by DeZeeuw and seconded by Danielson to proceed. Roll call vote – all ayes.

A permit from the DNR was needed to haul rip-rap to the dam. Still waiting on those. Hydrants will be flushed in April and auto flushers will be put back on.

A bid was received from Scott Concrete to do the sidewalk to Casey's at a cost of \$19,000. The 10 trees will be moved to the triangle at the dam by Mark's Nursery. Danielson was asked to check a water sample at 717 Clark Street and it had the perfect amount of chlorine and no iron.

Bowman mentioned the street in front of the new house at 1628 Thomas was crumbling. Danielson said he thinks a cement truck jumped the curb there and he said when the drive gets put in, he will speak with Broderick and the street will be repaired at that time if needed.

Hoy and Mayor Lantz, along with the entire council told Danielson he is doing a great job with the water treatment in Redfield and thanked him.

Persons interested in the Part-time summer position were Dave Griffith, Jim Hendricks, and Beverly Hurt. Public Works Director Danielson will meet with the park committee members, Godwin-Pote and DeZeeuw to make a decision on who to hire by April 19th. This was approved by a motion from Danielson and seconded by Hoy. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Nuisance updates: 508 Bridge Street, the owners have promised to come to Iowa by the end of April and decide if the property can be fixed up or if the home needs to be demolished. Attorney Stewart advised the council to hold off on abatement until the May meeting. Residence at 1112 Grant Street is showing some improvements and clean up continues. Will discuss again in May. A notice to abate will be sent to 517 Third Street following a lien search on the property, 1105 Thomas Street is still on hold. The asbestos has been removed at 626 Grant Street, waiting for okay from DNR to proceed with demolishing, 529 Third, will have trailer and cleaned up by Monday. A notice to abate will be sent on Monday if this is not cleaned up. No word on cleanup of 626 Third Street, 1216 Jackson Street has cleaned up his property and looking for titles to the cars. As soon as they are found, he will have them removed. Still some brush and wood in front of the house by will get that moved as well, 1206 First Street will get a notice to abate as no word from them, 1405 Thomas will receive a notice to abate as shingles and debris clutter his lawn, cars with flat tires and other items sit in city right-of-way. Bowman mentioned work is being done at 819 Thomas.

The City will not be updating the Zoning Regulation Code Book with Region XII. The Clerk will let them know.

Some warning citations regarding dogs were found in the police file. Mayor Lantz approved Danielson and Clausen to put notices out regarding dogs running at large and having no tags.

DeZeeuw moved to set the date for Public Hearing on the proposed budget amendment for May 3rd at 7:30 p.m. during the regular May meeting.

Motion by DeZeeuw and seconded by Danielson that the meeting adjourn. Meeting adjourned.



GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

This water supply obtains its water from the sand and gravel of the Alluvial aquifer. The Alluvial aquifer was determined to be highly susceptible to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide little protection from contamination at the land surface. The Alluvial wells will be highly susceptible to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application. 
