Gardening Tips for April in Zone 5 (Redfield)

Once again, the weather! Temperatures in the 70's, then down below freezing. Fruit trees are budding, rhubarb is 3 -4 inches tall, flowers have come up and because of the extreme temperature shifts, we are seeing damage. Protect the plants the best you can as we get through these fluctuations in temperatures. This type of damage is not the only type of damage to look for in the garden.

Another type of damage to look for in the garden could be from the chemicals that the homeowner applies to control pests in their lawn or in their garden. If you have pests in your garden/yard competing with your plants, there are things to consider. These are:

- What is the pest that is doing the damage?
- What is the lifecycle of the pest?
- Scout the pest to see how much damage is acceptable.
- Know the available control strategies.
- After control measures are taken, evaluate the results.

A person can utilize several options to control weeds, diseases, and insects. They could be:

- Mechanical control – hoe the weeds, put up fences to keep the rabbits out.
- Cultural control – pruning out the diseased leaves of a plant or do not plant your garden in a wet area that would give the plant's root system difficulty growing (causing diseases).
- Modify the environment – pruning fruit trees to improve the air flow to reduce humidity in the tree canopy. This helps manage disease.
- Genetic control – if in the past you have had a specific disease in your plants, purchase a variety that is resistant to that disease.
- Chemical control – this would be the method of last resort in managing weeds, diseases, or insects in your garden. Some chemicals are specific to a pest, others will kill both beneficials and pest species. Some chemicals will give you residual control and others just kill what the spray comes in contact with.

Chemical control, if used too often, or if the applicator does not follow the label, can have serious consequences for the environment and to neighboring crops/gardens/yards. Many of us in town have seen damage to our peppers, tomatoes, hibiscus, and other plants due to herbicide injury. Some of the symptoms might be a stunted plant, leaves that are deformed (with the veins of the leaves pulled together), and plants that twist instead of the normal growth patterns you would usually see.

Redfield City Council

The Redfield City Council met on March 4, 2024. Mayor Reed called the meeting to order at 6 P.M. Present were council members Gish, Stonehocker, Meyers, Cave and Danielson, Attorney Doll, Clerk Light, P.W. Director Danielson, W.W. Supt. Clausen, Fire Chief Short, EMS President Paardekooper and Code Enforcement Officer, Ed Leedum. Visitors were Rod Rummelhart, Luke Nims, Wes Bosier, Becca & Kyle Holt, Obie Meyers and Matt Hays.

Meyers moved to approve the agenda with two additions, one under Old Business to set a time and date for a Public Hearing on an Easement for the 903 and 913 Jefferson properties and Fireworks added under New Business. Danielson seconded. Roll call vote – all ayes.

A motion was made by Gish and seconded by Stonehocker to approve the Consent Agenda which included the minutes of the previous meeting and the claims paid. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Librarian Stonehocker was not present as she had a library meeting. The library report was included in the packet and reviewed.

Zoning Administrator Reed reported no building permits were issued in February.

EMS President Paardekooper reported nine calls for the EMS. Paardekooper thanked everyone for stepping up and working together during the Dexfield Diner fire. Meyers thanked Paardekooper for lining up food and drinks for the firefighters.

Fire Chief Short also thanked everyone that helped out that day, the community came out and everyone worked together. Kyle Holt spoke about the current fire station facilities being cramped, taking on Linden Fire and with 20 active members we will be doing some fundraising, the first one will be a soup supper on March 21st. The department has set up a 501.c3, setting up a website soon and will be talking to an architect about the cost of a new facility to house all the trucks and equipment.

A Dallas County Sheriff's report was not received in time for the meeting.

Rod Rummelhart from Rummelhart Financial Service was on hand to review the health insurance rates for employees for the next budget year. Several questions were asked and answered. The council members will review the documents and make a decision at a special meeting following the March 26th Public Hearing.

Matt Hays spoke to the council about holding a fundraiser for the Dexfield Diner. The council approved and Hays will get back to us when he decides on a date and has a few more details.

W.W. Supt. Clausen said he picked up the new mower and will get the old mower ready to sell. Clausen would like to order two loads of rip rap for the lagoons as they will have a DNR inspection soon. Stonehocker made a motion to approve the purchase, Gish seconded. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Code Enforcement Officer Leedum was on hand for questions. The council was happy with the report and notices sent. Leedum said a second notice will be sent certified after 21 days. The third step will be to abate the nuisance.

The Comprehensive plan was discussed and should be done by May. Stonehocker made a motion to waive the second reading and approve the third and final reading of Ordinance No. 2024-03, an Ordinance to Amend Section 99.01 of the Redfield Code of Ordinances Pertaining to Sewer Rates. Danielson seconded the motion. Roll call vote – Danielson, Gish, Stonehocker, Meyers, and Cave, all ayes. Motion carried. The sewer rate increase will go into effect on April 1, 2024.

The city is still in need of a Building Inspector. Gish said he had a couple of leads. Mayor Reed talked to Bolton and Menk and Danielson talked to McClure Engineering, neither of them do inspections.

A motion was made by Stonehocker and seconded by Gish to set a Public Hearing to approve an Easement for the properties of 903 and 913 Jefferson Street for 6:50 P.M. on April 2, 2024. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Gish moved and Stonehocker seconded to approve the Region XII, Housing Rehab Payment #16. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Gish made a motion and Stonehocker seconded to set a date for a Public Hearing on March 26, 2024, at 5 P.M., for the Proposed Property Tax Levy. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Cave moved Gish seconded to have Attorney Doll amend the ordinance for no parking on either side of Second Street from Jackson Street, south to First Street. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Fireworks were discussed. Danielson would like to see us not follow state code and only allow for fireworks on July 4th and December 31st of each year. Meyers said we should put a poll in the newsletter to see what the residents would like. This item was tabled.

Stonehocker made a motion to adjourn, Danielson seconded. Roll call vote Gish, nay. Stonehocker, Danielson, Meyers, and Cave, all ayes. Meeting adjourned.

Redfield City Council Public Hearing

Council member Danielson made a motion, Meyers seconded to open the Public Hearing for the proposed FY 2024/25 tax levy. Motion carried unanimously 5-0. Clerk Light reported that she had not received any written or oral objections concerning the proposed tax rate.

Gish moved and was seconded by Cave to approve the published proposed tax levy as presented for the FY 2024/25 budget. Roll call vote, motion carried unanimously 5-0.

A motion was made by Stonehocker and seconded by Gish to close the Public Hearing and adjourn at 5:05 P.M. Motion carried unanimously 5-0.

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Gardening Tips for April in Zone 5 (Redfield)

For those of us who want to protect our plants, we need to be aware of what others are applying to yards that are in close proximity to our property. I want to know when a product is being applied to a yard so I can protect my plants the best I can. These are things that should be done:

- If a neighbor has a lawn service, find out what they are applying to the yard, so you can read the label. The label is the law, and the applicator must follow the directions. There might be wind restrictions, temperature restrictions, and the potential for products like Dicamba, to volatilize and move to your plants. Volatilization can happen days after the initial application to the crop.
- A commercial applicator must put out signs on the property they are working on to notify the public that there is a chemical applied to the yard. This needs to be posted prior to the application and remain posted 24 hours after the application takes place.
- If you walk over to talk to the applicator and ask what he is spraying, he must by law tell you what the product is, provide you a copy of the label, and other information about the use of the pesticide being applied to anyone who requests the information.
- If you want to be pre-notified of an application, you need to get in touch with the lawn service (in writing), with your name, address, and telephone number. The lawn service is required (by law) to notify you in writing, in person, or telephone, of when the starting date and time of the application is and at least 24 hours before the scheduled application. This gives you time to protect the plants in case of herbicide drift or volatilization of the product into your yard/garden.

So, protect your plants from damage, now while the weather is variable, and later when we try to control pests that will do damage to these plants. If you go down the chemical road to help keep pests at bay, read the label, follow the label, and know your rights.

Gardening "To Do" Tips by Month for Redfield, IA

- This is a Busy Month!
- Companion planting – some plants grow well next to each other.
- Succession planting – when one crop is harvested, plant another in its place...this keeps the garden producing. Example – when lettuce is done, plant beans.
- Stagger planting – don't plant all your seeds at once unless you want a large amount of produce at one time (large family)
- Scatter poppy seeds in flower beds at this time.
- Fertilize grapes, raspberries, and blueberries.
- It is still OK to plant seeds indoors for transplanting later as needed.
- Sow seeds outdoors, but first check the weather forecast and the frost free dates for zone 5. Then you can plant asparagus, beets, carrots, chard, kohlrabi, leaf lettuce, mustard, onions, peas, radishes, turnips, and potatoes (good Friday).
- Establish new perennial plants as soon as the ground can be worked: grapes, rhubarb, raspberries, and asparagus.
- Repot houseplants if they need it.
- Start tomatoes, eggplant & peppers indoors.
- Clean up leftover dried debris from your garden.
- Keep notes and diagrams of what you plant and where you plant it. Keep track of the fertilizer rates you are using, and what variety of plants you are planting. If problems pop up, you will have a plan to follow.

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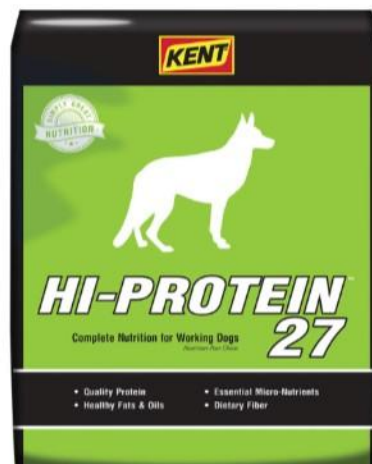
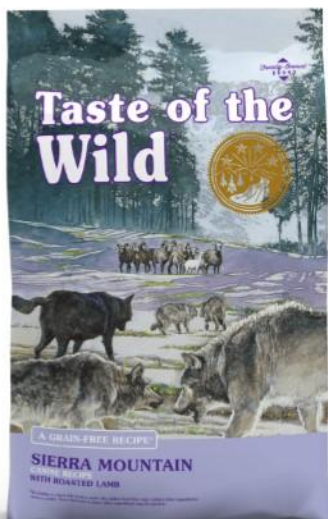

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Rex J. Harvey Foundation

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
