**Medicare Drug Prices reduced:** Medicare is beginning to reduce some drug costs for Medicare recipients, thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act signed into law by President Biden in August 2022. Under that law the cost of Medicare covered insulin is capped at \$35 per month, out of pocket costs for most vaccines under Medicare are eliminated and beginning in 2025 an annual \$2,000 limit is placed on how much Medicare Part D patients pay for their prescription medications. In addition the Inflation Reduction Act allows Medicare to negotiate the prices for some high cost prescription drugs beginning in 2026. And it puts tax penalties on drug makers that increase their drug prices greater than the rate of inflation. to polls most Medicare recipients are unaware of these cost savings. Remember the cost of drug plans can vary widely just as the coverage of the plans varies considerably. **Shingles vaccination**: Fewer than half of people over 65 years of age have received their Shingles immunizations. It is indicated for everyone older than 50. The Shingles vaccination is covered by most insurance. The inflation Reduction Act has ensured shingles vaccination insurance coverage for virtually all of us over 65 – as well as other immunizations for seniors. The Shingles shot are 95% effective in preventing the disease, if one get the initial vaccination and the booster 2 months later. These are available through most pharmacies.

Unfortunately, one of three of us seniors will get shingles. And we can get it more than once. Most of us know someone who suffered from a Shingles attack. It presents as a painful patch on one side of the body that blisters in about 2-3 days. It is best treated within 48 hours of presentation with an antiviral medication. But since it can cause severe pain for months or even years afterwards, prevention is best. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

**COVID Booster Vaccinations**: The latest wave of COVID is upon us. The most recent COVID vaccinations were approved by the Federal Drug Administration (FDA) last week. These are recommended by the experts and available at most pharmacies.

**Health Insurance Help:** There is help with finding an affordable health insurance plan for those 50 to 64 years of age. For those in that age group who obtain their health insurance from the Affordable Care Act (Obama Care) Marketplace, as extended by the 2022 Inflation Reduction Act, the average premium savings is more than \$950 per year. And the cost of those premiums is limited to no more than 8.5% of one's annual income.

#### **City Council Minutes**

The Redfield City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, August 6, 2024. Mayor Reed called the meeting to order at 7 P.M. Present were council members Danielson, Meyers, Gish, Stonehocker, and Cave, Attorney Updegraff, PW Director Danielson, WW Supt. Clausen, Librarian Stonehocker, EMS President Paardekooper, Fire Chief Short, Code Enforcement Officer Leedum and Clerk Light. Visitors were Peter Baker, Randey Peterson, Ben Shannon, TJ Spencer, Amy Short, Obie Meyers, Kyle Holt and Deputy Clemsen.

Danielson made a motion to approve the agenda, Cave seconded the motion. Roll call vote – all ayes.

Motion carried.

Meyers moved to approve the consent agenda which included the minutes of the previous meetings and claims paid. Cave seconded the motion. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

Librarian Stonehocker reported there were seven new patrons for the month. Wednesday, August 14<sup>th</sup>

at 6 P.M. is Book Club, Mahjong is 5 P.M. on both August 7<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> and children's crafts will be on August 13<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> at 2 P.M. Chair Yoga is every Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 P.M. Mayor Reed stated Stonehocker no longer needs to attend the monthly council meetings, once every quarter would be fine. The library is recruiting new board members, an application is available at <a href="https://www.Redfieldia.com">www.Redfieldia.com</a> if anyone is interested.

EMS President Paardekooper reported 14 calls for the month, two were fire calls and 12 were medical, one EMS call was billable to Linden. The EMS has been recertified with the state and good for three more years.

Chief Short reported the Fire Department will have a fundraiser raffle and side-by-side ride on September 14<sup>th</sup>. Short will have more details about it at the September 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting.

Zoning Administrator Bowman was absent but had a handout of building permits issued in July.

Code Enforcement Office Leedum was present and asked if there were any questions for him. July notices were sent out, two were certified.

Deputy Clemsen, Dallas County Sheriff's Office was on hand to answer questions of the police report received. Fifty-eight calls were answered with a total of 86 hours on patrol.

Ben Shannon visited with the council about ongoing noise problems. Mayor Reed said the council will need to decide on whether or not an ordinance is needed. This is tabled to the September 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting.

TJ Spencer also spoke to the council about the noise complaints.

Peter Baker said the gas line was removed from the shed on his property and they will take the building down themselves due to cost.

P.W. Director Danielson spoke about adding on to a water line for a new house to be built to the south on Division Street. Danielson said an ash tree in the park lost a limb, the tree has been treated and Doug Jones with Marks Nursery thinks the limbs need to be elevated to make it safe. Cost is \$2,800 to take it down. This will be tabled to the September meeting. Danielson also said the bike trail intake has been finished and Grimes Asphalt will be here in September to do the street replacement on Grant.

W.W. Supt. Clausen had a handout from Electric Pump to retro the Taylor Street lift station. Cost is \$57,435. The other two lift stations have been rehabbed and this one is in need of an upgrade. Gish moved and Stonehocker seconded to approve the rehab of the Taylor Street lift Station at the above cost. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

Central lowa Regional Housing Authority needs to have a new 28E Agreement signed as the three-year appointment of Pamela Danielson, Representative and Debbra Light, Alternate have expired. Gish moved and Meyers seconded to approve Resolution 2024-14, a Resolution Declaring the need for a Housing Authority in the City of Redfield and appoint Danielson and Light to represent the city. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Reed spoke on whether or not to allow open burning of fire pits in the downtown business district. This was tabled.

Mayor Reed said the catalyst grant money from the City of Redfield designated for the Dexfield Diner and Pub has been denied.

A bid of \$6,883.92, from Access Systems to upgrade the firewall at the City Hall and Library was discussed. A motion was made by Gish and seconded by Danielson to approve the 5-year support agreement. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

A handout on Building Inspection Services done by Veenstra & Kimm was reviewed. Meyers moved and Danielson seconded approval to have V & K come to the September 2<sup>nd</sup> council meeting. Roll call vote — Danielson, Meyers, Gish, and Cave, all ayes. Stonehocker, nay. Motion carried. There being no further business, Stonehocker moved that the meeting adjourn, Gish seconded. Meeting adjourned.

#### **Public Comment:**

Mayor Reed addressed the Board about a letter that he had received from Erika Eckley from the IPIB concerning an alleged violation of Iowa Code 21.5 during the Library Board's June meeting by some of the Trustees. He asked the Board to address the matter in a timely manner.

#### Agenda of July Meeting: Approved unanimously.

#### VI. June Meeting Minutes: Approved unanimously.

Amendment= Add the Closed Meeting which occurred before the regular Redfield Library Open Meeting took place on June 3.

#### V. Financial Report: Approved unanimously.

New treasurer Cox presented the library closing financials for the end of fiscal year 2024 which ended June 30. She presented the new fiscal year's situation and the concern that not all of the library's past bills had been paid because of the financial deficit and that book money had to be shifted to pay the Librarian's June salary. Because of the past year's financial shortfalls and the upcoming year's financial situation, Cox suggested the Trustees and Librarian implement a new financial policy.

#### VI. Librarian's Report:

Librarian Stonehocker presented that book circulation and audio

book use had increased. The summer programs were going well. She presented a calendar with tally marks of attendance numbers for library visits, monthly book club, chair yoga, and summer program. The past policy has been to charge patrons to use the copy machine 25 cents a page for black print and 50 cent for colored print.

#### VII. Old Business

#### \* Strategic Plan:

Discussion: A number of things need to be done to successfully implement the Strategic Plan launched in 2022. This Plan was created in 2021 with community input and is to be reviewed quarterly.

Examples of strategic plan items that have been implemented: using media to communicate library events and hosting guest speakers.

Examples of the strategic plan that needs to be done: community surveys, writing grants, fundraising activities, visiting other libraries and networking with other librarians, teen activities, etc.

#### \*Online catalog:

Discussion: Librarian Stonehocker is to develop an implementation plan for the Apollo system when it's installed and present that plan to the Board. Trustees discussed how nice it will be for the community to have an online catalog to see what resources are available at the library and an online catalog is necessary for the library to be an accredited library.

#### \* **Resolution 2024-1**:

Discussion: The library trust/savings account and paperwork has been sent to the city attorney. This is pending the attorney's review.

#### \* Finance policy:

Discussion: Brainstorming ideas for mapping out a new budget plan and amending library hours to work within the library's budget for this fiscal year.

#### \*Library Hours Overages:

Discussion: How can we change up the library hours to better meet the needs of our community? Do working people need the library to be

#### Gardening Tips for September in Zone 5 (Redfield)

I feel like a broken record, reporting that we are in the midst of another heat wave of temperatures in the upper 90 degrees, with heat indexes in the triple figures. It makes it difficult to go outside to work in the garden, not to mention the risk to one's health working in these temperatures. Protect yourself by working in the early morning (when the temperatures are lower), dress for the weather (wide brim hat, sunscreen, long sleeves) and stay hydrated (drink plenty of water).

The garden still needs your attention. Weeds need to be pulled, and tomato plants need to be supported as they continue to produce fruit. Peppers, tomatoes, zucchini, eggplant, and melons need to be picked for our enjoyment. Monitor your apple and pear trees for fruit that is getting ripe. There will soon be an abundance of these fruits soon. Pick up dead fall apples and pears to reduce disease pressures (put them in your compost bins).

Continue to keep others in mind when you find that your garden has a bountiful harvest. The sweet corn season is over and now our family is getting ready to take apples to deliver to one of the food banks (Waukee Area Christian Services) that has come to Redfield. If you find you have extra fresh produce, consider donating it so others can enjoy it as well. You can always bring your surplus produce to our Redfield City Hall to be distributed to those who would appreciate adding fresh produce to their diet.

There are still plenty of chores to do as the season progresses

#### Gardening "To Do" Tips by Month for Redfield, IA

#### September:

Some crops are ready to be planted once again. These would be cool weather crops that will thrive in the cool weather this fall. Here are examples of what to plant:

Spinach

Chard

Lettuce

**Radishes** 

Control weeds before they go to seed. Do not throw the pulled weeds into the compost bin as the seeds will survive and once the compost is used, you will reseed these plants into the garden beds.

It will be time to bring in plants that you want to keep. Here are examples:

Geraniums

Miniature roses

Basil

**Parsley** 

Fall is the best time to divide perennials. To reduce transplant shock, prepare the new planting site before dividing your plants

Harvest second planting of cool season crops

Weed strawberry beds. Like gardeners, they do not like weeds

September/October is a good time to amend your soil. Add leaves and or compost to increase the organic material in your soil. Save wood ashes, this will increase the phosphorus, potassium, and calcium in your soil. Use these ashes in your vegetable gardens and flower beds.

Storing Veggies:

Gourds, summer squash, and pumpkins should be harvested before the first frost, pumpkins continue to ripen after harvest

Handle everything carefully so as not to bruise or nick the skins

Dig potatoes now that the above ground portion of the plant has dried up.

Discussion: When Erika Eckley from the Iowa Public Information Board could come and address the Board concerning Iowa Code 21.5. Librarian Stonehocker will contact Eckley to see when she can come.

\*Committees: Trustee Cox distributed information about proposed committees for the Trustees to review and discuss at the next meeting. Committees listed were Executive/Personnel, Finance, Library Access/Collections, Marketing/Outreach.

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#### **Rex J. Harvey Foundation**

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
