City Council Minutes

The Redfield City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, October 8, 2024. Mayor Reed called the meeting to order at 7 P.M. Present were council members Danielson, Cave, Meyers and Stonehocker, Attorney Updegraff and Clerk Light. Council member Gish was absent.

Danielson made a motion to approve the agenda, Cave seconded the motion. Roll call vote – Stonehocker, Meyers, Cave and Danielson, all ayes. Motion carried.

After discussion on one of the bills, a motion was made by Cave and seconded by Meyers to approve the consent agenda which included the minutes of the previous meeting and the claims paid. Roll call vote – Meyers, Cave, Danielson and Stonehocker, all ayes. Motion carried.

Library Board member Pauletta Cox gave the library report.

Zoning Administrator Bowman reported one permit was issued for solar at 1002 Edwards Street. Bowman said Harold Harshburger who signed in as a visitor would like to combine two residential lots so he can build a garage. Harshburger then spoke and said the lots are located at 1210 First and 1214 First Street. Meyers moved to approve the request to combine parcels, Stonehocker seconded the motion. Roll call vote – Cave, Danielson, Stonehocker and Meyers, all ayes. Motion carried.

Code Enforcement Officer Leedum was not present due to vacation. The council reviewed the list of September notices sent.

The Building Inspection Services Agreement was reviewed and tabled.

EMS President Paardekooper reported 12 calls for the month and said a new Jr. member was added, making 12 persons on the EMS roster.

Fire Chief Short reported four fire calls in September and some training done in a burn trailer. Short said the side-by-side fundraiser was a success.

The Dallas County Sheriff's Office reported 58 calls for the month, with a total of 88 hours of patrol time.

Visitors Karen Hollett and daughter Anita were present with complaints. Mayor Reed informed them they would need to fill out and sign a complaint form in order to be heard at a future meeting. Dexfield Diner owner, Steve Roberts also gave an update.

Redfield Clinic News

Voting: Election day is Tuesday, November 5, 2024. If you have not voted already, Please make a plan to do so and go do it on or before Tuesday, November 5, 2024. On election day everyone is equal regardless of socioeconomic status, sex, race, color or creed. We all get one vote a piece so be sure to cast yours. If you are not sure if you are eligible to vote or not, you must be registered. The deadline for registering is on Election Day. To get information on how to register: go to Vote.org. You must be 18 years old or older by election day and be a citizen of the United States and you can register at the polling place. Bring a photo ID (driver's license, passport) with your address on it. Let's honor our military veterans, especially those who made the ultimate sacrifice so we could be free by voting on election day this November 5th.

COVID Infections: We are still seeing positive COVID tests at the Clinic. Getting a COVID booster now decreases your chance of being hospitalized and getting very ill by 80%. Therefore everyone over 65 should get a COVID booster unless you have had a bad reaction to one previously. Younger folks with preexisting conditions such as heart, lung disease or impaired immunity systems should receive the new COVID booster. All of us at the Redfield Clinic get the recommended vaccination because we do not want to get sick or spread it to others. We are believers that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

We have also had one case of influenza A last week, so we are also recommending people get their flu vaccine as well now or at least before Thanksgiving.

MEDICARE OPEN ENROLLMENT: You can explore your Medicare coverage options from October 15th to December 7th. You can change to another plan that may save you some money but make sure it will cover you current medical providers and also help pay for the medications you are currently taking. You can find information on Medicare coverage at Medicare.com. The Dallas County Public Health Nurses have a health navigator who can also help you find the correct information (at phone number (515)993 3750 or you can call the Senior Health Insurance information Program (SHIIP at 1-800 -351-4664).

Darlene Pitsenbarger: Darlene passed away on October 20th, 2024 at the wonderful age of 100 and 6 months. Darlene was a school teacher who taught many people in our community. Darlene has a special place in our heart for a lot of reasons. She wrote a very persuasive letter to several lowa legislators when we needed the legislature to pass legislation to keep care in Redfield. She will be missed but she taught us all how to live and make a difference. Darlene was willing to go out of her way to help others. She will be sorely missed by us and many of us in the Redfield community. Thank you to all others who have helped us keep medical care in Redfield.

Fentanyl: Last year Fentanyl overdoses caused the death of 73,000 Americans, including some in the Redfield area. To avoid being one of the victims of a Fentanyl overdose, do not take any Medications unless you know the drugs came from a reputable source.

Health program for Redfield Clinic patients: Redfield Clinic is participating in a program to keep our patients healthy. Because of this program you may get a contact from folks reminding you of the things you can do to stay healthy. These may include screening examinations: ie bone density tests, Mammograms, Pap smears, Prostate exams, blood sugar and cholesterol blood tests and other programs offered by your insurance. Early detection can make a difference between surviving a medical problem or succumbing to it. Most of us would not hesitate to do preventive maintenance on our vehicles because we do not want them to break down unnecessarily. We should treat our own bodies with equal care. We think this program will help us get this done. If you have any questions about this program, please contact us at the Redfield Clinic.

The city code of ordinances gives the Library Board exclusive control of all funds allocated to the Library, so this current practice could be modified as soon as possible.

Gardening Tips for November in Zone 5 (Redfield)

Remember this point from last month? -

"With the overcast skies and cool weather, I found myself looking for additional tomatoes that are trying to mature. Many of my green tomatoes look so perfect, but not ripe. I got some advice from a friend at the Stewart library that if you pick these green tomatoes at the end of the season, put them in a paper sack, and bring them into your basement, they will ripen. I am going to do this; I hope this works!!"

Guess what? My tomatoes in the paper bags are ripening. I have been able to freeze several quarts of tomatoes from these bags and have several bags of green tomatoes turning red and will be totally ripe soon. I need to listen to my friends and follow their advice more often. It is good to listen to other gardeners and find out what has worked for them in the past and incorporate their ideas into your garden space.

I now have turned my attention to watering my garden and fruit trees with the stored rainwater that I have collected this year. I collected around 1500 gallons of rainwater this summer and have used all but 150 gallons of it to date. I need to get my tanks empty prior to a hard continuous freeze to ensure the tanks do not rupture due to the expansion of the ice in the tanks. Putting together a rain barrel system to catch rainwater this year was the best project I did in the garden – it saved money from purchasing water from the city. Watering my fruit trees will help them survive our upcoming harsh lowa winter.

Here are some other things to do in the garden for the month of November

Gardening "To Do" Tips by Month for Redfield, IA November

- Do not forget to do a soil test for your garden. Now is a good time to get this done. Rather than put on an excessive amount of fertilizer (not knowing your soil test results), you could put on the recommended amount and probably save on fertilizer costs. Over fertilization can contribute to disease issues later in the season.
- If you are considering organic gardening, now is a good time to do your research to make sure you have the time and determination to follow through with this concept – there are obstacles in controlling weeds, insects, and diseases – but it can be done by learning from others that have grown gardens this way in the past.
- Take care of your tools, with care they can last for generations. I have tools that have been handed down to me from my grandfather because he took care of them first. Oil the metal portion and do not forget to take care of the wood handles.
- Pull weeds and clean the garden of debris. Try not to leave plants that have gone to seed as they will infest the garden for years to come
- Use your leaves that have been raked from the yard and incorporate them into the garden. These leaves have organic matter that your soil needs and appreciates
- Cover your root crops with straw (if you did not harvest all the crop and have left some tubers in the ground). It gives them added protection from the cold.
- Have you drained all of your hoses and turned off the water to your outside spigots? Don't let the spigots freeze and break. That water leak could result in a flood in the basement!!
- Empty outside flowerpots especially the clay or concrete ones. Water can freeze and thaw in these containers and fracture the pot if not emptied.



Rex J. Harvey Foundation

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
