### **Redfield Clinic News**

We should aim to walk 10,000 steps per day. Why? Because walking improves mood, increases blood flow, decreases cortisol (a stress hormone), decreases blood sugar, burns fat, reduces over thinking, and increases dopamine (a neurotransmitter that helps transmit calming signals).

What sunlight does: increases vitamin D, decreases pain, helps to regulate hormones, strengthens bones, improves immune system, enhances nutrient absorption, improves sleep, regulates our circadian rhythm, heals wounds and fights depression. But too much causes painful sunburns and increases the chance of developing skin cancers.

Health hints:

- Best sleeping time is from 10PM to 4AM
- Avoid heavy meals after 5PM
- Drink more water in the mornings and less in the evening.
- Avoid lying down right after taking medicine.
- Avoid answering your cell phone when the battery is down to 1 bar as the radiation is 1,000 times stronger.
- If someone is yelling at you, calmly say "Are you having a bad day?"

- When someone apologizes to you, don't say "No problem". Instead say "Thank you" and they are much less likely to do it again. Helpful cold treatments from the Mayo Clinic Health Letter:

While there still is no cure for the common cold the following tips can help you feel less miserable:

- Salt water gargles for sore throat (1/2 teaspoonful of salt dissolved in 8 ounces of warm water)
- Drink plenty of fluids to loosen congestion (especially warm water with honey and lemon juice)
- Saline nasal drops or sprays (these can ease stuffiness)

- Nasal decongestants like Afrin or Four Way can relieve congestion but need to be limited to no more than 3 consequent days to avoid rebound stuffiness when discontinued.

- Chicken soup consumption can thin mucus and have reduce congestion.

Cold remedies that don't work: Antibiotics kill bacteria but are no help against cold viruses, Zinc studies show mixed results and need more study. Caution: Zinc sprays or gels can cause permanent loss of smell.

Library Board Secretary Cox was not present but the circulation report was reviewed.

Zoning Administrator Bowman was not present as there were no permits issued in December.

Code Enforcement Officer Leedum was not present.

Tony Kendall visited with the council about the notice he received and promises to have his property cleaned up by April 30<sup>th</sup>. Attorney

Updegraff said he will prepare a consent decree.

EMS President Paardekooper reported 21 calls for the month of December with one billable to the City of Linden.

Fire Chief Short reported five of the 21 calls were for the Fire Department.

Deputy Myers with the Dallas County Sheriff's Office was on hand to go over the police report. Thirty-six calls were answered with 118 hours of patrol and 14 hours spent on calls. Meyers asked if hours of patrol are included on Redfield's time when the officer is sitting at the Heartland Coop fertilizer shed or along a road in the area. Deputy Myers said yes, the officer is most likely working on reports in his car.

Both Public Works Director Danielson and W.W. Superintendent Clausen were absent from the meeting.

Meyers made a motion and Stonehocker seconded to approve a bid of \$8,352, for new shade sails at the Redfield Depot. Clerk Light said the cost could be slightly more due to ordering after the first of the year. Roll call vote – Stonehocker, Cave, Meyers and Danielson, all ayes. Gish, nay. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Stonehocker and seconded by Cave to have Meyers work on a grant for speed signs. Roll call vote – all ayes.

A budget workshop will be held on Monday, January  $20^{\rm th}\,at\,5{:}30$  P.M.

Meyers talked about the Redfield Senior Citizens Homes in town and how they are not tax exempt anymore due to the buildings being paid off. The Redfield Senior Citizens Board asked if the City of Redfield could own them so they would then be tax exempt. Attorney Schlagel will do some research and report back. This item was tabled.

An Ordinance concerning the placement of shipping containers on property within the city limits of Redfield was reviewed. Discussion was held and this item was tabled.

The City Clerk position was discussed, the position was offered but turned down due to not enough money. The ad will be sent to the Stuart Herald to be run again.

There being no further business, Stonehocker moved and Gish seconded that the meeting be adjourned.

Meeting adjourned.

### Gardening Tips for February in Zone 5 (Redfield)

Another cold month. Last week, as I thought of writing this article, it was 5 degrees below zero and with the windchill, 30 below. Today it will be near 36 degrees and by Tuesday, it will be close to 50 degrees. With all of these temperature swings, the insects that are hiding in the ground debris will come out from their homes and freeze when the temperatures go back below freezing (dead bugs are good – if they are not beneficials). I can only hope that the trees are not fooled by the temperature fluctuations and start to bud out too soon and become damaged. Yesterday a friend of mine told me that he had a lot of fat Robins in his yard. They must have thought it was time to fly North to get out of the cold weather down South. Will they be surprised when it gets cold once again? Crazy weather!!

### Gardening "To Do" Tips by Month for Redfield, IA

- Tools...if you haven't done it, sharpen tools or if you need to, buy a new spade and other tools that were not taken care of.
- Order seeds as soon as possible or risk not being able to get the variety you really want.
- Check the planting schedule for starting tomatoes, peppers, and other plants that you like. Try to work around neighbors that are spraying pesticides that might move into your yard and damage your garden plants.
- Stop and visit a nursery to find out what they are doing at this time of the year.
- I have assembled my seed starting supplies...lights, heat mats, pots & potting soil. I know that I have a plan on what to grow under the lights in the basement, it is time to start.

I would also like to encourage everyone to look at companion planting for the upcoming season.

- Some people utilize companion planting to add nitrogen to the soil (planting legumes peas, beans, clover, or alfalfa)
- Others use companion planting to help with the soil structure (break up a hard pan, or a clay zone that will constrict the roots of your plants)
- Many people participate in companion planting to help encourage beneficial insects to visit their garden/yard (butterflies, bees, some beneficial beetles and praying mantis)
- Companion planting can also help with disease and weed management

There are several books at Menards that deal with home gardening. One that I bought the other day was on companion planting: Plant Partners – Science based companion planting strategies. There are many other titles to look at for the upcoming season there at Menards.

Another great resource for your gardening would be the Dallas County Extension Office. They are in tune with what to grow, when to plant the plants and how to grow the plants we have selected. They have many publications on gardening, whether it be weed & insect control, how to take soil samples, and what practices work in our part of the state. If presented with a issue in your yard/garden, they can help with the identification of the problem and offer solutions. If they are not sure about the remedy, then they go to ISU for help. This is a resource we all should be using. I am sure that the future will be filled with more cold days, but here is a quote I got from the

stuart Herald:

"At press time, thermometers were registering a balmy 3 degrees... keep smiling.

Remember the August sunshine, the changing of the leaves and long hikes in the timber? Well, when the thermometer registers several digits below zero, just be consoled that this too shall pass.

We have the promise of sunny springtime; green grass and leaves will reappear (along with a few weeds), and this frigid weather will just be another memory"

This encourages me that this winter will pass soon, and spring is just around the corner.

### **Snow Removal Notice**

Snow Ordinance for the City of Redfield will be in effect until April 1, 2025.

**STREETS: 69.10 SNOW REMOVAL.** No person shall park, abandon, or leave unattended any vehicle on any public street, alley, or City-owned off-street parking area during the time period of November 1st - April 1<sup>st</sup> of each year if it is snowing or snow is forecasted, or the snow is in the process of being removed or plowed from said street, alley or parking area. If the street has been fully opened and the snow has ceased to fall, one may park on any public street, alley, or parking area where parking is normally allowed.

**SIDEWALKS: 136.03 REMOVAL OF SNOW, ICE, AND ACCUMULATIONS.** The abutting property owner shall remove snow, ice, and accumulations promptly from sidewalks. If a property owner does not remove snow, ice, or accumulations within 24 hours, the City may do so and assess the costs against the property owner for collection in the same manner as a property tax. The abutting property owner may be liable for damages caused by failure to remove snow, ice, and accumulations promptly from the sidewalk. within 24 hours.





### **Rex J. Harvey Foundation**

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
