Smoking tobacco damages blood vessels in both the heart and brain. That is why smoking increases the risk of heart attacks and strokes. Furthermore, the nicotine in tobacco causes blood vessels to narrow. That can contribute to high blood pressure. And vaping nicotine or parking nicotine pouches between your gums and cheek does the same thing. Plus, researchers have found that e-cigarettes increase the chance of developing congestive heart failure.

Five ways the free and confidential national quit line (1-800 QUIT NOW [1-800-784-8669]) can help to stop using nicotine and quit smoking:

- 1) The quit smoking counseling service is free with no judgement
- 2) Quit coaches help create a plan that can work for you
- 3) Quit coaches can help you get quit smoking medications
- 4) Quit coaches provide helpful tips on how to quit

<u>Alcohol based antibacterial mouthwashes can kill beneficial microorganisms in your mouth</u>. Some of those organisms produce chemicals that help control blood pressure. To avoid this adverse effect, experts recommend using an alkaline mouthwash. Or one could brush the teeth with a fluoride toothpaste and brush or scrape the tongue to control mouth odor at least twice a day.

Good Vaccine News: A recent study of COVID-19 vaccine recipients found the more symptoms a person reported the higher the level of protective antibodies achieved. These side effects included fever, chills, upset stomach, tiredness, aches and pain at the injection site. While unpleasant, these effects were far outweighed by the benefits: preventing severe or long term illness, hospitalization or death. And these side effects can be treated by cold packs, over the counter pain relievers like Tylenol or Ibuprofen and planned rest (like receiving the immunization before a weekend). Simply put, the benefits of vaccination far outweigh the risks. And like the physical therapists say no pain, no gain.

City of Redfield Council Meeting

The City of Redfield met in regular session on Tuesday, February 4, 2025. Mayor Reed called the meeting to order at 7 P.M. Present were council members Gish, Stonehocker, Meyers, Cave, and Danielson, Clerk Light and Attorney's Updegraff and Schlagel.

One addition to the agenda was added under Old Business, Update on City Clerk position. Danielson made a motion and Meyers seconded to approve the agenda with the addition. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

Stonehocker made a motion, Cave seconded to approve the Consent Agenda, which included the minutes of the previous meeting, claims paid and liquor license for the Diner, pending dramshop approval. Roll call vote – all aves. Motion carried.

Library board members Pauletta Cox and Julia Swallow spoke about changes at the library and asked the council to help with the cost of adding a handicapped door to the front entrance of the library and a push bar to the back door. Bids should be available for the next meeting. They also received an application for a new member to the library board. Meyers asked to table this until next month.

Librarian Stonehocker has resigned from her position so the search for a new librarian is on. Library board member Wiles also resigned due to boundary issues but will remain as an honorary member.



City of Redfield Council Meeting

Zoning Administrator Bowman reported no permits were issued in January. Bowman said an application was given to the new owners of 1621 and 1623 Thomas Street to build. Scott Froyen has a request to combine parcels on the agenda tonight for approval.

Leedum was not present to comment on Code Enforcement but had a handout for the council to review.

EMS President Pardekooper reported 13 calls for the month with two billable to Linden. The EMS now have 12 people on the roster, two are junior members.

Fire Chief Short reported 13 calls, three were fire calls. Short asked the council to approve the bid from Tigges Comfort Services to replace a heater in the Fire Station at a cost of \$2,568.00. The cost will be shared by Fire and EMS. Gish moved to approve the installation of a new heater for the EMS/Fire Station, Meyers seconded. Roll call vote — all ayes. Motion carried.

Sergeant Myers with the D.C. Sheriff's Office was present. He reported 80+ hours of patrol time with 11.5 hours spent on calls.

P.W. Director Danielson said he was looking at new pickups to replace his 2016 Ford. He will have more information on that in the following months. Electric Pump worked on the Casey's lift station after a pump failed. The Taylor Street lift station will not be repaired until April as parts are not available.

Danielson also talked with Ganoe Excavating about the pullover area at Casey's and said Ganoe could grade an eight-foot x 60' pad and put in a culvert for appx. \$2,500.

Danielson reported he received a call from Bob Schmell at Diamondhead Lake asking about selling them brine. Danielson said a price of 75 cents per gallon would be a fair price. Stonehocker made a motion and Meyers seconded to have Attorney Schlagel write up a contract to be signed by both parties. Roll call vote- all ayes. Motion carried.

Danielson also mentioned the two-inch line north of town still needs upgraded to a six-inch line, he has visited with R.D. McKinney and will have prices by next month for this project.

Ordinance 2025-01, an Ordinance adding a Chapter Concerning the Placement of Shipping Containers on Property within the City of Redfield was discussed and tabled.

The Redfield Senior Citizens Homes were discussed and tabled.

The City Clerk position was discussed. The applications and resumes will be scanned to Meyers to get her input. Danielson has already reviewed them.

Stonehocker made a motion and Gish seconded to approve Resolution 2025-01, A Resolution to Appoint a Representative and Alternate Representative to the Dallas County Emergency Management Commission to attend the Commission meetings on behalf of the City of Redfield. Michael Short will be appointed as the Emergency Management Commission Representative and Wade Reed is appointed as the Alternate Representative. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

Resolution 2025-02, A Resolution adopting a Procurement Policy for Federal Grant and Loan Award Funds was introduced. The City recently applied for a generator grant through FEMA and if awarded, the policy will need to be in place. Gish moved to approve Resolution 2025-02. Stonehocker seconded the motion. Roll call vote — all ayes. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Danielson and seconded by Cave to approve a Request to Combine Parcels #1304229017 and #1304230012. Roll call vote – all aves. Motion carried. The homeowner will need to have it recorded.

A budget meeting was held in January and at that time, it was noted that water and sewer rates are still not where they need to be. Rates need to be raised by another 25%. Gish moved and Cave seconded to table this month but keep it on the monthly agenda. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

Stonehocker moved and Cave seconded to approve a donation in the amount of \$100 to the WCV After Prom Committee. Roll call vote – all aves. Motion carried.

A donation request was received from New Opportunities. They provide assistance programs to our residents from the federal and state government. This was tabled until the next meeting due to not being on the agenda.

There being no further business, Stonehocker moved the meeting adjourn. Gish seconded the motion.

Meeting adjourned at 8:28 P.M.

Gardening Tips for March in Zone 5 (Redfield)

I am starting to sound like a broken record — (-6 degree cold temperatures once again as I write this with wind chills of -30 to

-40 degrees) Even my house plants that are next to the window are cold!

I thought it would be fun to highlight a plant this month since it is cold outside. This month I would like to highlight: Blueberries: To plant or not to plant?

My wife Robin loves blueberries so last spring when I saw blueberry plants in gallon containers at Lowes, I bought a couple of them. I planted them inside a fenced area (to protect them from rabbits), the weeds took over, one died from rabbits eating it and the other plant did poorly. This was an impulse buy, and since I had not done any research to see if I should plant this cultivar, I soon found out that I should not have bought blueberries for my garden.

Here are some things to consider when planting blueberries:

- Find hybrids that are suitable for our cold winter temperatures
 - o Blueberries are a perennial plant that will live for over 20 years if cared for properly
 - o A good variety for this area is Northern Highbush (Vaccinium corymbosum)
- ✓ How to plant
 - o Blueberries need full sun
 - o Can be planted as a bush or as a hedge (4 feet between plants 10 feet between rows)
 - o Plants can grow to a height of 4-5 feet
- ✓ Soil pH
 - o Soil pH should be between 4.5-5.5
 - Do not plant until your pH is ideal (large changes in pH may take a full growing season to make the soil acidic for the plants)
 - Use elemental sulfur to lower pH avoid using aluminum sulfate (aluminum could build up in the soil to create toxic growing conditions)
- Soil situations to avoid
 - Pure clay (having raised beds can somewhat help with drainage
 - o Calcareous soils (they are high in lime content and lowering pH is impractical)
- Fertilization
 - Annually apply appropriate amount of Nitrogen
 - o Use high N, low P and moderate K (an example is 24-6-18 fertilizer)
 - o Blueberries have a shallow root system so do not incorporate fertilizer too deep
- Moisture requirements
 - o Blueberries need water irrigation is the best
 - o Mulch at the base of the plants to retain moisture and deter weeds from competing for moisture

Blueberries will produce poorly for the first 5-7 years then will produce for 20 years total if they are planted correctly. As with any impulse buy, I did not do my planning for this crop. Here is what I did wrong when planting my blueberries:

- The clay soils in my garden are not compatible with blueberries without making the soil more acidic. Putting out amendments to the soil would have taken a year to change the acidity prior to planting blueberries.
- 2. I planted the blueberries too close together and would stunt future growth
- 3. Rabbits got into the patch, and they love young blueberry plants
- 4. I did not mulch or keep constant moisture to the young plants causing stress and poor growth
- 5. A person should plant several cultivars to help with pollination and I did not do this
- 6. Did not know that blueberries would produce for up to 20 years I will need to rethink planting blueberries in my garden.

Gardening "To Do" Tips by Month for Redfield, IA

- Start some indoor seeds...flowers like petunia, snapdragon, impatiens, and celosia. Vegetables like broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower.
- Take soil samples in your garden and take them to our local cooperative so they can test for acidity or alkaline content. Get their recommendation on how to balance the soil pH.
- In late March, prune fruit trees, berry bushes, and other woody ornamentals while they are still dormant and apply dormant oil spray to your fruit trees to help control insect feeding.
- Some plants like poppy, nigella, larkspur, and peas need a few weeks of cold weather to germinate. Direct sow outdoors where they will grow best — even if there is snow on the ground.
- March is the time to start tomatoes, eggplant, peppers, broccoli, cauliflower, and cabbage inside.
- Remove dead growth from your asparagus patch (or burn the thatch). Side dress asparagus and rhubarb with nitrogen fertilizer.
- Remove mulch from established roses & strawberry beds: remove dead leaves from any perennial plants and take them to the composting bin.
- Sow grass seed in your yard or in bare patches if the weather allows.
- Fertilize your perennial beds with a balanced fertilizer, such as 6-12-12, and your vegetable garden with 12-12-12.
- Keep notes and a diagram of where & when you plant, type of fertilizer used, the variety of plants you grew...if a problem occurs you need to know how to treat it and document the results of your actions.

Rex J. Harvey Foundation

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
