Avoiding skin cancer: As the sun gets higher in the sky with the approach of summer, it is important to remember that the most common cause of skin cancer is excessive exposure to the sun's ultraviolet radiation. Although sun light is the main source of ultraviolet radiation, the tanning beds are another important and avoidable source. Skin cancer is the most common cancer. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer in their lifetime.

Although anyone can develop skin cancer lighter skin toned people are at much greater risk than those with darker skin tones. In addition to UV exposure, other risk factors for developing skin cancer include family history, chronic inflammation, and a weakened immune system. Early detection is key to successful treatment of skin cancer. The three main types of skin cancer are basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and malignant melanoma.

Basal cell cancer: These account for 80% of all skin cancers. It usually presents as a skin colored, translucent and shiny skin bump. But it can also show as a pink patch that bleeds easily. It usually appears on the sun exposed areas of the arms, head and neck.

Squamous cell cancer: It is the second most common type of skin cancer. It usually shows up as a firm red bump with a crusty center and ragged edges.

Melanoma: These account for about 1% of all U.S. skin cancers. But it is the most likely to be deadly. Melanoma can look like a mole that keeps enlarging or, rarely, a black or brown streak in a finger or toenail. In addition there are rare forms of viral caused skin cancers, including Merkel cell carcinoma and Kaposi's sarcoma.

The American Association of Dermatologists recommends seeking care at the earliest signs of melanoma using the ABCDE rule:

A: Asymmetrical: One side of the skin growth looks different from the other

B: Border: The edges are irregular

C: Color: The color is various shades of black, brown, white, red or blue

D: Diameter: The size is greater than a pencil eraser (greater than 6 mm diameter). Seek professional evaluation if the size is less than the pencil eraser if other signs of melanoma are present.

E: Evolution: Rapid change in size, shape or color

The rare acral melanomas can occur on the palms and soles. And melanomas can rarely occur inside the mouth, in skin creases and other non-sun exposed areas of the body.

Prevention of skin cancer: Wear a mineral based, broad spectrum sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 30, and protective clothing. Avoid prolonged exposure to the midday sun, between 10 AM and 4 PM central daylight time. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Danielson had a bid on a radar sign at a price of \$4,315.00, Stonehocker made a motion and Meyers seconded to purchase the sign. Roll call vote, Stonehocker, Meyers, Danielson and Cave all ayes. Gish, nay. Motion carried.

Forrest Aldrich, Engineer with V&K, had plans and specs for the emergency Xenia water hookup. A motion was made by Gish and seconded by Cave to approve the project. Bids will be open on April 24, 2025, at the City Hall. We will consider bids and award the contract on May 6, 2025, at the next council meeting.

Two bids were received for the water line extension at the north edge of Redfield. One bid from Underground Solutions at \$18,250 and the other was from RD McKinney at \$12,500.00. Stonehocker moved and Gish seconded. Roll call vote, all ayes. Motion carried to approve the bid from RD McKinney.


Pat Griffith then shared that she has been in contact with the WCV Art teacher regarding Poppy Posters. She will continue working with her and we should have posters by our next meeting.

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Gardening Tips for May in Zone 5 (Redfield)

This year the weather has been a little warmer than last year. Last year at this time, fruit trees budded out early in April, then a cold snap worried many of us that the trees were damaged. This year all of my fruit trees have blossomed and look great with no significant forecast of a cold snap in the near future to worry about. With the warm temperatures, our Asparagus and Rhubarb look great, and we have had several meals of asparagus already. I have also planted my Spinach, Onions, Peas, Pak Choi, and Zucchini. They are all up and doing fine. Using my rain tanks, I have collected about 500 gallons of rainwater to use when the weather turns hot and dry. Collecting rainwater has been one of the best things I have done for my garden (and pocketbook). I have also killed 12 tomato plants by overwatering them inside waiting to transplant outdoors – rats!! Why did I plant these tomatoes so early??

Gardening "To Do" Tips by Month for Redfield, IA

- Have a rain gage measure rainfall so you know when to water your plants. If your garden has clay in the soil, water has difficulty moving out
 of the root zone. Too much water can cause root rots.
- Sow seeds outdoors: beets, carrots, chard, kohlrabi, cabbage, spinach, turnips, onion sets, and peas.
- Keep hilling potatoes. If you do not hill potatoes, the sun will turn the skin green.
- Plant new shrubs and trees.
- Begin hardening off the plants you started inside from seeds in April (set them outside during the day and bring them inside at night).
- Fertilize perennials at this time of the year (do not fertilize in season or fall)
- Protect transplants from insects (especially cutworms). Support tomato plants with a four inch stick directly next to the stem. When inserted
 into the ground the stick should be two inches below and two inches above the ground. If you see cutworms, do not be afraid to pick these
 insects off of the plants and squish them.
- In April it should be safe to plant most vegetables outside.... Cucumbers do not do well unless the soil is warm.
- Have your trellis in place for tomatoes, peas, pole beans, and gourds.
- If you have raspberries, cut down last year's fruiting canes to the ground to promote new growth.
- If you are interested in straw bale gardening, Joe Karsten has a website that you can visit to get more information on how to garden this way (potatoes can be grown this way).
- Know what plants grow best in your area.
- Use the map on the back of the seed packets to show you the zones, when to plant, height of the plant, how deep to plant the seeds, and the length of the growing time.
- Using plants specific to your zone will be more successful and you will spend less time, money, and irritation by growing accordingly with proper soil, temperature, and precipitation patterns.
- Take advantage of online research, talk to other gardeners, and learn from their mistakes I know I continue to make mistakes over and over again.

We wanted to touch base on **Invasive Plants**

- Who determines this classification?
 - o Internation, Federal, and State officials regulate this classification.
 - They set guidelines on how to eradicate these species.
- Examples of invasive species include:
 - o Chinese Wisteria
 - o Ornamental Bittersweet
 - o English Ivy
 - o Sweet Autumn Clematis
 - o Butterfly Bush
 - Japanese Honevsuckle
- In my yard I would consider these plants to be invasive. They might not be classified as an invasive species, but they are weeds I do not want they are:
 - o Dandy Lions
 - o Poison Ivy
 - o Creeping Charlie
 - o Crab Grass
- The farm community has other species they are required to eradicate in pastures and row crow crops situations.
- Check out the USDA National Website for more information on invasive species

The Dallas County Plant Sale is on Saturday, May 3rd at the Dallas County Fairgrounds in Adel lowa. The doors open at 9:00 a.m. and most likely be sold out by midafternoon. There are Master Gardeners on hand to answer questions you might have on plant placement and what would work good for your garden, See you at the plant sale!

This arrangement was initiated when the trail was first opened thirty-five years ago by the Dallas County Conservation Board, headquartered in Perry. So - supplies of bottled drinks, salty and sweet snacks are being purchased. Local people are signing up to make homemade cookies and/or to staff the depot - where they will offer a friendly local touch to riders and the chance to purchase snacks and cold drinks.

We have local people who for years now have been signing up to fill either a morning or an afternoon four hour shift at the depot on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays from May through October. We are in need of more volunteers - if you are interested contact one of the names below to find out more, and sign-up to give it a try. It is a fun volunteer job - just four hours once a month (or every other month) with the chance to greet, meet and help trail users out. (Redfield's homemade cookies are known far and wide for their nourishing and energy-producing qualities! They are also known for their price - \$.25 per cookie.)

TRAIL UPDATES (From the Raccoon River Valley Trail Monthly Newsletter):

"Phase IV of the South Loop Rehabilitation is underway, involving the widening of bridges and resurfacing the trail with concrete. The three mile section impacted by this closure is from Adel to Ortonville (at the Dallas Center exit off Highway 6). This construction is expected to continue through the summer, and the trail is closed at each end of the affected sections. There is not an official detour for the closure."

GENERAL INFORMATION

This water supply obtains its water from the sand and gravel of the Alluvial aquifer. The Alluvial aquifer was determined to be highly susceptible to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide little protection from contamination at the land surface. The Alluvial wells will be highly susceptible to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application. 

Rex J. Harvey Foundation

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
