Keeping medical care in small towns

Thank you to all who asked our Representative in Congress, Zach Nunn, to cosponsor a bill to keep medical care in small towns like Redfield, H.R. 5199. This bill improves access to care by allowing Physician Assistants (PAs) and Nurse Practitioners (NPs) to run a federally certified Rural Health Clinic (RHC) if state law allows this.

Iowa law permits PAs and NPs to run medical clinics but federal RHC law allows only physicians to run RHC clinics. H.R. 5199 would allow PAs and NPs to operate these clinics as well. That improved regulatory flexibility would help keep a medical clinic in small towns across our nation and in Redfield.

Recently, several Iowa small towns have had their only medical clinic close (Allison, Gladbrook and Whiting). And some may remember that Redfield's only medical clinic closed in 1988 but though it was a challenge, we were able to reopen it as a Rural Health Clinic. H.R. 5199 would give towns the option of converting to a PA or NP run RHC clinic to keep care in their community.

Redfield Clinic News

Flu vaccinations: We are still seeing cases of Influenza B in the Redfield area. March is usually the last month of the Flu season. Influenza vaccinations are still available at most clinics and pharmacies.

Diabetes: early detection and treatment

Diabetes mellitus is a disorder of how our bodies process carbohydrates. It is characterized by impaired ability to produce or use insulin and maintain blood glucose levels. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) 10% of Americans have diabetes, and 1/3 of American adults have pre-diabetes: that is pre-disposed to developing diabetes. And 80% do not know they are pre-diabetic.

Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune condition where the pancreas no longer has the ability to produce insulin. Insulin is needed to move glucose into the cells where it is used for energy so the cells can do their jobs. Type II diabetes occurs when the pancreas produces some insulin but not enough to move enough glucose into the cells. Gestational is a variant of type II that occurs during pregnancy. It can adversely affect both mother and baby.

This is important because if you know you are diabetic or are pre-diabetic, there are simple things that can be done to detect these conditions and improve your health or avoid the serious consequences of these conditions. Available at most clinics, the hemoglobin A1C blood test gives the average blood sugar for the past three months. A result of 6.5% or greater is diagnostic of diabetes. A result of 5.7% to 6.4% is pre-diabetic. 5.6% or less is normal.

Additionally, a fasting blood sugar (nothing to eat or drink except water for 8 hours) of more than 125 mg/dl is considered diabetes per the American Diabetic Association.

Any fasting blood sugar between 100mg/dl to 125mg/dl is considered prediabetes. A random blood sugar of 200 mg/dl or more when having symptoms of excessive thirst, frequent urination, weight loss and blurry vision can indicate diabetes.

Since type 1 diabetes is an auto-immune disease, blood testing detecting antibodies to insulin, zinc transporters and glutamic acid decarboxylase means you are at risk for developing type I diabetes.

A glucose tolerance test is a way to detect gestational (pregnancy) diabetes. It measures blood sugar 2 hours after drinking 75 grams of glucose. Diabetes is present if blood sugar 2 hours later is 200mg/dl or greater. Pre-diabetes is 140-199 mg/dl and normal is less than 140mg/dl.

The complications of diabetes, including a shortened life, can be minimized with diet, exercise, medications possibly including insulin, glucose testing regularly and continuous glucose monitoring. Early detection, self-monitoring of glucose levels and close follow up with your medical care provider can prolong life and health. Perhaps someday with the ingenuity of our youngsters, and if AI doesn't take over like HAL in 2001: A Space Odyssey, we will find a cure for diabetes.

Redfield Public Library Regular Meeting: January 2, 2026

Call to order at 5:03 PM

Trustees: Pauletta Cox, Lauren Lang, Larry Moone, Julia Swallow, Carolyn Wilson, Library Director: Ashley Kuonen,

Approval of minutes from 11/26/2025: It was moved by Moone to approve the minutes of the November 26 meeting. Second by Lang. Approved by all.

Approval of Agenda for 1/2/2026: Cox moved to table Continuing Education if necessary. Moone moved to approve the agenda.. Second by Wilson. Approved by all.

Financial Report:

It was moved by Wilson and seconded by Moone to approve the payment of bills totaling \$1609.91 pending clarification on the legal fees. Approved by all.

Progress and Service Reports:

Library Director Kuonen reported that there have been 8 new patrons in November and the door count was 235. There were 343 checkouts. The patron computers were used 42 times and we had 70 wireless connections to our public internet. Sixteen programs were offered in November with 68 attendees.

The collection value is being updated so the invoices are not 0. This is a continuing project. Storytimes in December were a hit with the group making pancakes after the early December event, and making homemade snow and snowflakes following the second reading program.

The library hosted a Winter Sowing How to with attendees taking home a container of seeds that they winter sowed.

One new program at the library is that young patrons can sign up for 1000 Books Before Kindergarten. Each participant receives a free book with a tracking sheet. A small prize will be given for every hundred books read. After 1000 books, they will receive a certificate of completion.

Preschool Playtime is another new event on the second and fourth Friday of the month. Toddlers and preschoolers can play at the library and interact with books and peers.

The biggest event of the month was Cocoa, Crafts and the Clauses with 73 people in attendance.

Upcoming events include: In January, still working to get a group called Fraud Fighters to give a presentation on how to avoid being scammed. The library also plans to start an exercise program in January in conjunction with City Hall. Have started planning for Summer Reading Program. Will be working hard on accreditation as it is due February 28.

Unfinished business:

The trust resolution amendment and the finance policy will be addressed at a committee meeting next week.

New Business:

Library Trustee Application process was looked at and tabled until after more consideration. Budget was reviewed and after making a few adjustments was moved to approve by Cox. Second by Moone. Motion carried.

Increased hours and pay were discussed for the library staff.

Evaluations: Ashley has evaluation forms from other libraries. Lang and Moone will determine which evaluation form best fits our needs, as it must match our strategic goal.

Janitorial Services. Cox moved to change the janitor hours to one hour per week on Sunday. They will clean the bathroom, sweep and clean the hardwood floors. The librarians will do the rest of the cleaning. A new job description will be created

Bylaw correction for upcoming accreditation. It was moved by Moone and second by Lang to change the wording to meet accreditation requirements "The library director shall be present at each meeting of the board." Approved by all.

Trustee Continuing Ed Training was Chapter 7 of the Trustee handbook.

Motion by Moone to adjourn the meeting. Second by Cox. Meeting adjourned.

City of Redfield Council Meeting

The City of Redfield met in regular session on Tuesday, February 3, 2026. Mayor Wiley called the meeting to order at 7 P.M. Present were council members Roberts, Stonehocker, Meyers, Paardekooper, and Zeransky, Clerk Paardekooper, Attorney Schlagel and Clerk Farber.

Meyers requested corrections to special meeting minutes from January 21st. Meyers made a motion, Roberts seconded to approve the Consent Agenda, which included the correction to the special meeting on 1-21-26 and minutes of the previous meetings and, claims, all ayes. Motion carried.

Library Board President Julia Swallow gave library updates. 243 patrons came through the door in January; computers were used 35 times and 91 wireless connections to the public internet.

Zoning Administrator Bowman reported a zoning letter of approval was given to SCG for a dealership license. Hanging Rock Estates subdivision was discussed. Meyers recommended that Scott Finneiste be contacted to attend a meeting and discuss. Zoning was also contacted about development of 360 acres for commercial datacenter, visit with developer for more information.

Code enforcement list of complaints received by clerk to report. Shipping container located in front of Dollar General on frontage road was reported and 4-wheeler sitting in front yard at 1610 Thomas St.

Attorney Schlagel will update council after hearing about 1216 Jackson street nuisance property. Maxwell property did not appear on the final copy of agenda but was on the first issue of agenda.

Council agreed the subject could be discussed. Ellis Law suggests proceeding with code enforcement. Meyers motioned to proceed with legal and Stonehocker seconded. Stonehocker, Meyers and Zeransky voted aye, Roberts and Paardekooper voted nay. Motion passed.

Police report for December was attached, reporting 87 hours of patrol, 10 hours on calls, 97 hours total, 80 required. Fire chief Short requested Fire/EMS report be moved to front of agenda. Request approved. 17 calls total for FIRE/EMS 11 calls for EMS and 6 calls for fire.

P.W. Director Clausen reported that city brush pile was burnt on 1/8/26. 1/12 repaired water service line at 1502 Grant St. Interviews held on 13th and 14th. 1/21/26 hired public works technician Tim Hodson with start date of 2/9/26. 1/26 2022 Chevy 3500 to Bob Brown. 1/30 completed work at booster station/water tank. April 6-17th Story Construction and MVP to work on Ion exchange softener resin removal/replacement and system maintenance will take place.

Stonehocker moved and Meyers seconded to approve a donation in the amount of \$100 to the WCV After Prom Committee. Roll call vote – all ayes. Motion carried.

Market to Market Relay May 9th. Meyers motioned to approve running code enforcement ad. Zeransky seconded. Meyers, Roberts, Stonehocker and Zeransky ayes, Paardekooper voted nay. Ad approved – motion carried

A donation request was received from New Opportunities. They aid programs to our residents from the federal and state government. Stonehocker motioned and Zeransky seconded all ayes motion approved.

Resolution 2026-03 CIRHA 28E agreement was approve. Clerk Sherri Farber to act as primary representative and Steve Roberts as alternate representative.

Redfield Development Committee was inquiring about the electronic sign. Lions club purchased sign and was gifted to the American Legion.

Redfield Development committee needed Rural Boost Grant approval. Roberts motioned and Meyers seconded all ayes. Motion Approved.

Time clock for city hall was approved. Roberts motioned and Meyers seconded. All ayes. Motion approved.

Gardening Tips for the Month of March

Pruning: Complete pruning for fruit trees (apples and pears), grapevines, and berry bushes while they are still dormant.

- Grapevines: Prune to no more than four fruiting canes with 7 to 10 buds each.
- Raspberries: Remove canes that have already borne fruit or those thinner than a pencil, then shorten the remaining young canes by at least a foot.
- Best Practices: Use sharp tools for clean cuts and do not paint the wounds; allow them to heal naturally.

Seedlings and Planting

- Indoor Starting: Avoid starting vegetable seedlings too early, as compact seedlings are healthier than leggy ones. Start leeks and onions indoors before mid-month. After mid-month, you can start broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, kohlrabi, and Brussels sprouts to be set out in six weeks.
- Outdoor Planting: Once the soil can be worked after mid-month, you can sow spinach, lettuce, peas, carrots, and radishes directly into the ground.

Perennials and Cleanup

- Cleanup: Wait until temperatures are consistently 50 degrees before removing plant debris to protect overwintering beneficial insects. Cleanup can then continue through April.
- Dividing/Moving: As perennials emerge, they can be easily divided or moved. Doing this early allows for more symmetrical growth.
- Spring Bulbs: Don't worry about bulbs that emerged during the warm February weather; the leaves will not be harmed by returning cold temperatures.

Maintenance

- Mulching: Refresh your mulch layer just before or as perennials emerge, but take care not to bury the plant crowns.
- Soil Care: Never work in the garden when the soil is wet to avoid compaction. If the soil sticks to tools or forms a solid ball when squeezed, it is too wet to work.
- Houseplants: With increased daylight, indoor plants will require more water and half-strength fertilizer.







SNOW REMOVAL NOTICE

Snow Ordinance for the City of Redfield will be in effect

November 1, 2025 to April 1, 2026

STREETS

69.10 SNOW REMOVAL. No person shall park, abandon, or leave unattended any vehicle on any public street, alley, or City-owned off-street parking area during the time period of November 1st April 1st of each year if it is snowing or snow is forecasted, or the snow is in the process of being removed or plowed from said street, alley or parking area. If the street has been fully opened and the snow has ceased to fall, one may park on any public street, alley, or parking area where parking is normally allowed.

SIDEWALKS

136.03 REMOVAL OF SNOW, ICE, AND ACCUMULATIONS. The abutting property owner shall remove snow, ice, and accumulations promptly from sidewalks. If a property owner does not remove snow, ice, or accumulations within 24 hours, the City may do so and assess the costs against the property owner for collection in the same manner as a property tax. The abutting property owner may be liable for damages caused by failure to remove snow, ice, and accumulations promptly from the sidewalk. within 24 hours.





DALLAS COUNTY LOCAL HOUSING TRUST FUND, INC.

An Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation Program

To provide and expand safe and affordable housing to low-income residents of Dallas County. Assisting homeowners within Dallas County with housing repairs and correcting code violations.

To qualify for assistance from this program, the homeowner must meet the following requirements:



The property must be located within Dallas County.



The property must be owner-occupied and the homeowner's primary residence.



Property taxes, mortgage payments and homeowner's insurance must be current.



The property must be a single-family residence, condominium or townhouse, and taxed as real property. *Houses being purchased under contract are not eligible.



Income limits of the household must fall at or below 80% of the area median household income, based on the State Housing Trust Fund Annual Income Limits. (see chart below)

What are the financial implications to the homeowner?

- The work is paid for by the Program through funding from the Dallas County Local Housing Trust Fund, Inc., the participating cities and other contributors.
- The financial assistance will be in the form of a forgivable loan with a maximum loan amount \$15,000 and a minimum loan amount \$500.
- The loan will be recorded as a mortgage on the property, with a term of five (5) years, decreasing 20% each year, and bearing no interest.
- The loan only comes due if the homeowner sells within the five years following the time of participation.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. This water supply obtains its water from the sand and gravel of the Alluvial aquifer. The Alluvial aquifer was determined to be highly susceptible to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide little protection from contamination at the land surface. The Alluvial wells will be highly susceptible to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application. A detailed evaluation of your source water was completed by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, and is available from the Water Operator at 515-371-1364.




Rex J. Harvey Foundation

A fund has been set up to raise money for a statue of Rex J. Harvey of Redfield.

Rex attended Dexfield High School, where he helped his track and field team win two state championships under the legendary coach Dean Roe. He then earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering at Iowa State University, where he attended on an athletic track and field scholarship. During which he participated in four U.S. NCAA Division I Championships.

Rex was a Vietnam War Veteran, who served as a Captain in the United States Airforce. As a member of the US Military track and field team he represented the United States at many international competitions, as well as the 1972 and 1976, US Olympic Trials in the Decathlon.

Rex went on to earn a Master of Science Degree in Systems Management at the University of Southern California. During his many years as an engineer, he designed and holds several patents for nozzles. He ended his career as a Research Development Engineer at Parker Corporation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Rex continued his track career as a master's competitor, during which he won 13 straight national decathlon championships, as well as several world championships in the decathlon, pole vault, and as a member of several relay teams.

Rex was inducted into the USATF Masters Hall of Fame in 2000. He was an integral part of developing age-graded tables for scoring masters track and field athletic performances. He was elected to two terms as Vice President Stadia of World Masters Athletics (WMA). At the time of his death, he was serving as the President of USATF Masters Track & Field. Rex had accumulated one million total decathlon points, making him a World Record holder.
